Year of the Word "The God who speaks Reflection

The **first reading** is taken from the Book of Wisdom 6:12-16 and cites watchfulness as the key to a faithful religion and understanding of wisdom. The **second reading** is from the first Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians 4:13-18 where he addresses a practical and doctrinal problem faced by the community. Paul had preached to them and

left them with the impression that the second coming of Christ was imminent. Some died before the *paruosia* and their concern is what has happened to them. Paul states firmly that what matters is that they interpret these events because of their faith and hope in the Lord. **The gospel** this Sunday reminds and asks us to get ready and prepare at a much deeper level. We are not simply waiting for the bus to come; we are asked to prepare for Jesus. What does the mean for us to be watching and waiting for Jesus? The question that is implied in the parable of the wise and foolish wedding guests, is what are we actually doing *while* we are waiting for Jesus? Are we sitting around with no thought or concern for ourselves and others, or are we actively living our daily lives with meaning and purpose?

Weekly Message from Fr Alan

What are we to make of the gospel reading today ? The parables of Jesus are easy to remember, but not always easy to understand, harder still sometimes to apply. We can imagine these ten young women, excited at being bridesmaids, half of them so excited they forget to bring oil with them for their lamps, and all of them so excited they fall asleep with exhaustion and have to be wakened when the bridegroom comes. We can imagine, perhaps, the wedding customs of the time: the

bridegroom coming to the bride's house to claim her from her father and take back her to his home. Only he's late. In this society, apparently, it is the bridegroom's privilege to be late for the wedding not the bride. But the ending of the parable doesn't quite fit. It talks about keeping awake; but that was not the problem. All the bridesmaids fell asleep. The real problem was that some were unprepared. o what is the parable about? It is clearly a moral tale, but what is the moral? What are we to take from it today? If it is about being ready, ready for what? We can all think of situations where we or our friends have been 'caught napping'. I imagine we have all had those moments when guests have arrived earlier than expected and the table is not laid, or when deadlines have been advanced and the work was not done. So has the world been caught napping (is that phrase an echo of the parable?) by this pandemic, we are still struggling to cope with, and in the last few months we have seen a second wave and again our ministers apparently caught napping by the sudden change. Contingency plans and forward thinking make a difference to coping with a crisis. But could anyone have been prepared for what we a experiencing. The parable of the bridesmaids includes the call, 'Come to meet the Bridegroom.' The parable says to us, we meet Christ the Bridegroom every day - in our daily encounters with other people, especially with those in need, and more particularly in those encounters we don't remember and whose significance we don't understand. Preparedness for dying is to be seen in the way we live from day to day by the grace of God. Preparedness is in our sense of accountability for our neighbour and those who depend on us, in our response to the needy, who may not appear to us to be at all Christ-like. Preparedness is to be seen too in those other daily and weekly encounters with Christ, in prayer and worship and Bread and Wine. That, we may say, is the oil that will keep our lamps alight at the critical time.

Despite the efforts of the Bishops, Members of the House of Lords and MP's, the Government has not agreed to allow Churches to remain open for the celebration of Mass. We await that time with deep longing but we should be patient and understanding. It is most important that the protection of the health of us all , especially of the most vulnerable is protected.

Stay Safe What we do know about this Virus is it's unpredictability we must all pray that soon this pandemic will be over with minimum loss of life. We have made great strides in the treatment and understanding and with Gods help that will continue.

Many will be worried as we again enter a lockdown. However, we have got through it before and hopefully this lockdown will only last Four weeks. Please keep yourselves safe and also keep an eye on any friends or neighbours who might be vulnerable and need support.
