GOSPEL REFLECTION: Mark 6 1-6



This gospel reading gives us an account of the visit of Jesus to his 'home town', which we know to be Nazareth. Just as he has already done in Capernaum, here too he teaches in the synagogue on the Sabbath. But the reaction of the townspeople is not positive. How can this local man be gifted with so many fine qualities? They are determined to find fault with his wisdom

and with his actions.

They go on to speak of his family. They know his mother, and his trade. His humble origins should rule out anything special. 'And they would not accept him' The sense of the Greek word used here suggests they were determined to find excuses for not accepting him. There are two problems here. The first is that Jesus has not had the formal training required for rabbis. He lacks the credentials expected of a teacher. The second is that Jerusalemscribes have begun to spread malicious rumours about him. Mark's Cospel tells us they asked: Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him and these miracles that are worked through him? We also learn his own would not accept him.

This passage is important in the unfolding drama of the gospel. It was not only the religious and political leaders who were against Jesus. Jesus quotes what seems to be a common proverts: 'A prophet is only despised in his own home.' The healing work of Jesus is not forced on those who do not wish to receive it, and who are not open to the new deeds the Lord is doing.


Here was the ordinary man, who was going to work every day, and now taking on the role of preacher and prophet. We too are ordinary people, living within our families, going about our daily work. Nothing divine about that – or maybe it's one of the most divine things we can do! Work and family bring us close to God who is working all the time and who is loving all the time.

How might you see God today – creation, love, silence, care? A new baby in the family – God's creation of new life with us, or someone who is very ill but in weakness of the body but is also finding peace in the prospect of heaven...that is God at work. God is around in the depth moments of life.

What does this gospel make of Jesus? He makes sense of our lives with us and for us, teaching and healing with compassion and love. We do not know himfully, we don't know all he said, but we can live by the echo of his words.
