GOSPEL REFLECTION: The cross transforms everything. An instrument of execution and death has become an instrument of life. Jesus did not recoil from his destiny: he recognised that in the cross his 'hour' had come and that his whole life had been a journey to this moment. So much of Jesus' teaching is taken from observing the natural world. He took note of a principle within nature that life is born from death. We all understand that in order for a plant to grow, a seed needs first to be buried in the earth. Unless this happens it remains only a single seed – if buried in the soil, then many seeds are produced. Jesus saw his own death mirrored in this process of nature. Jesus knew that his entire life was a preparation for his suffering and death upon the cross. In the history of the world there has never been a more important death, for from this death would come life for the world.

In 1980 Archbishop Oscar Romero was murdered by an assassin's bullet as he celebrated the Eucharist. Moments before, in his sermon, he had said: 'To each one of us Christ is saying: "If you want your life and mission to be fruitful like mine, do as I. Be converted into a seed that lets itself be buried. Let yourself be killed. Do not be afraid. Those who shun suffering will remain alone. No one is more alone than the selfish. But if you give your life out of love for others, as I give mine for all, you will reap a great harvest."

Just as Jesus laid down his life, so we are called to lay down our life for others. Just as the cross was Jesus' hour, so we too are called to take up our cross and follow him. Only if we are willing to die to ourselves in this way, will we know the joy of harvest in our lives. This cross reveals God's love - it makes it plain for all to see. Jesus' cross is the hope of our eternal salvation, our greatest joy and greatest hope.

'Apart from the cross there is no other ladder by which we may get to heaven'. St Rose of Lima.
