GOSPEL REFLECTION

Just as Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, so are we. Jesus was tempted and tested for forty days and so too are we. Lent is our time in the desert, our wilderness; we too can expect to be tempted, tested and enter into spiritual conflict, an interior battle. No servant is greater than his or her master: Just as Jesus was tempted and tested, so too are we. Jesus emerged from the desert with a message, which was, if you like, the fruit of his tempting and testing. His message was this: 'the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel' (v.15). We do well to ponder it and reflect on its meaning for our lives. Repentance and conversion aren't popular ideas these days – but this begs the question, have they ever been? There can be no doubt that our culture has lost a sense of sin, and in losing a sense of sin it has also lost a sense of repentance and conversion. Sin conjures up all kinds of negative thoughts about our human condition, which we would prefer to push under the carpet. Nevertheless, as the Catechism of the Catholic Church states: 'Sin is present in human history: any attempt to ignore it or to give this dark reality other names would be futile' (CCC.386). Sin isn't a cold, judicial or forensic list of things we have or haven't done, but rather it involves not believing or trusting in the Father's tender love, not believing or trusting that Jesus has a wonderful plan for our lives, not believing or trusting that the Holy Spirit forgives and heals us.

A mystery of faith is that holiness doesn't obviate the call of repentance, but rather encourages it. The saints weren't increasingly less aware of their sin and need of salvation but rather increasingly more aware of it. Despite their sanctity and love of others, they understood that they needed the grace and healing mercy of God. To be aware of and sensitive to our waywardness, sinfulness and dire need of God's grace isn't about negative introspection, but about knowing the joy, liberation and freedom of repentance, leading to ongoing conversation.

Lord, thank you for your mercy and unfailing love. Wash away my iniquity, cleanse me from my sin and restore to me the joy of salvation.
