GOSPEL REFLECTION: When we see someone achieving something truly amazing, to express our admiration we might say that they, 'Walk on water'. By this we mean that their talent is so extraordinary that they could even defy the natural law of gravity. This phrase alludes to the miracles we read about in today's Gospel: Jesus walking on water and calming the storm. The supernatural phenomenon of walking on water isn't unique to the Gospels. In Greek mythology the gods Horus and Orion both defied gravity in this way, as did various heroic figures in Hindu and Buddhist mythology. The difference between these accounts and the one we find in today's Gospel is that the former are recorded as myths and the latter is recorded as eyewitness history, as fact.

Do you believe Jesus walked on water? It's a fair question which deserves a fair answer. The Church encourages us to question, scrutinize and interrogate and we've nothing to fear from the truth. However, we must also be aware that the Gospel writers weren't writing fiction or perpetrating a kind of propaganda - they were recording real events.

Vatican II's Dei verbum puts it like this: 'The sacred authors wrote the four Gospels, selecting some things from the many which had been handed on by word of mouth or in writing, reducing some of them to a synthesis, explaining some things in view of the situation of their churches and preserving the form of proclamation but always in such fashion that they told us the honest truth about Jesus.' (para.2). The apostles were first-hand witnesses who handed down to us a reliable account of what happened in Jesus' life. In other words, we can stake our lives on the fact that Jesus walked on water, thus revealing himself to be the Lord of sea and earth, the Master and Creator of the natural world. The reason he could walk on water and command the storm to cease it because he created them. 'Few souls understand what God would accomplish in them if they were to abandon themselves unreservedly to him and...were to allow his grace to mould them accordingly.' (St Ignatius of Loyola)

REFLECTION: ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

The doctrine or mystery of Mary's Assumption goes right back to the beginning of the Church, dating back to the apostles themselves. At the council of Chalcedon in 451AD Emperor Marcian asked the Patriarch of Jerusalem to bring Mary's relic to Constantinople to be enshrined there. The Patriarch explained that there were no relics of Mary in Jerusalem and that 'Mary had died in the presence of the apostles; but her tomb, when opened later...was found empty and so the apostles concluded that the body was taken up into heaven. Today we also have hope in our own destiny. Mary was assumed, body and soul, into the glory of heaven. Our faith is rooted in the truth that we too will rise from the dead, body and soul. Like Mary we will do so not because of our own merits but through the merits of our Lord Jesus Christ.

All powerful and ever loving God: you raised the sinless Virgin Mary, mother of your Son, body and soul to the glory of heaven. May we see heaven as our final goal and come to share her glory.'
