GOSPEL REFLECTION: Today's parable has an interesting link to the theme of yesterday's Gospel, which focused on the joy of being made sharers in Jesus' mission. The parable declares that the vineyard will be leased to other tenants who will be more faithful and will deliver the produce when the season arrives. The context is that Jesus was being challenged by the chief priests and elders, who were questioning his authority.

Jesus answered them in three ways. First of all, he asked them what they thought about John the Baptist's authority. Then he presented a scenario of two sons being asked by their father to go and work in his vineyard. One says he won't go, but then thinks better of it and goes, while the other says he will go but in fact doesn't. Jesus used this example to say that it was the tax collectors and sinners who responded to John the Baptist's preaching (and Jesus' own teaching), while the Jewish leaders didn't.

The Parable of the Wicked Tenants was the third part of Jesus' response Notably, Matthew tells us that, 'When the chief priests and ...Pharisees heard his parables, they realised that he was speaking about them' (v.45). They were angry at this because the implication wasn't only that they were like the wicked tenants, but also that their position was to be given to others, who would take responsibility for God's vineyard.

As we saw in yesterday's reading. Jesus has shared responsibility for the Father's vineyard with new tenants. However, the deeper truth isn't that the Jewish leaders have simply been replaced by new Christian leaders. Something much more radical has occurred. It's Jesus himself who has replaced the tenants! In the end, no one could shepherd God's people faithfully, no one could really care for God's vineyard in the way God wanted. Only the Son could fulfil the role. Through his death and resurrection, Jesus is now and forever the One who cares for the vineyard. In fact, he has become the Vine itself. Our life and mission is simply a sharing in his life and mission.

Lord Jesus, you are the Vine, we are the branches. You are the true Shepherd, we are the sheep. Lead us in the way of salvation.

It is such a good way for the children to gain understanding of their faith. Children's Church is every Sunday at 9.30 am at St George's and 11.15 am at Holy Spirit Church. OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY: The month of October is a month of devotion to Our Lady, mother of Jesus, mother of God. We are encouraged to say the Rosary and in church there will be our usual devotions before Mass for a short while each day. At Lourdes, Mary encouraged St Bernadette to say her Rosary and devotion to the Rosary has been more widespread since that time although it was well known at the time of St Dominic in the late Middle Ages, who gave the Rosary great encouragement. The great victory of the Christian naval forces at the battle of Lepanto in 1571 over a more numerous Islamic and Turkish fleet and troops was attributed to prayer and penance and the saying of the Rosary.
