GOSPEL REFLECTION

We don't always appreciate how shocking, scandalous and downright offensive Jesus' teaching was to his first hearers and can be even today. His teaching on the Eucharist was first met with outright hostility and rejection. The disciples said, 'This is a hard teaching who can accept it?' (John 6:60), Jesus' teaching divided and scandalised.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church sheds light on this: 'The first announcement of the Eucharist divided the disciples, just as the announcement of the Passion scandalised them: "This is a hard saying: who can listen to it?" The Eucharist and the Cross are stumbling blocks. It is the same mystery and never ceases to be an occasion of division. "Will you go away?" The Lord's question echoes down through the ages as a loving invitation to discover that only he has the words of eternal life and that to receive in faith the gift of the Eucharist is to receive the Lord himself.' (CCC1336).

The miracle of the Eucharist is that Christ himself is made real and present. Perhaps we don't think and pray on such things too much? Perhaps we receive the Eucharist without pondering and reflecting on the awesome privilege it is to receive Christ in this way?

In the Eucharist the body and blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ are truly, really and substantially made present. In other words, Jesus is made real and present in the most full and complete sense. Jesus' presence in the Eucharist is substantial in that he himself is wholly and entirely present. What a gift! What a blessing! What a grace!

Who can accept this teaching? We can, for through the grace of revelation and the light of the Holy Spirit this ceases to be a hard teaching: it is the gift of eternal life.

'In the most holy sacrament of the Eucharist, in this sacrament of love, we have true life, a blessed life, and true happiness. Because in it we receive not only those graces that perfect us but the very author of these graces.'
(St Pio of Pietrelcino).
