**GOSPEL REFLECTION:**

We join Jesus at a wedding in the small town of Cana, north of Galilee. Through this story we are introduced to John's sign theology: 'This, the first of his miraculous signs. Jesus performed at Cana in Galilee' (v.11). What was the purpose of the signs? What was John wanting to highlight? John answers the question for us: 'He thus revealed his glory, and his disciples put their faith in him' (v.11).

In today's sign and wonder' Jesus transformed water into wine. In other words, low-grade water (used for ceremonial washing) was transformed into the highest-grade wine in massive quantities. Each of the six stone water jars would have held between twenty and thirty gallons.

Not only the quantity but also the vintage shocked and surprised the master of the banquet (see v.9), who was at a loss as to why such a fine-quality wine was served at the end of the banquet when the quests were probably too far gone to appreciate it!

The superabundance of wine was a reminder of a common prophetic figure of speech found in the Old Testament for the dawning of the messianic age (see e.g. Amos 9:13-14; Joel 3:1). In that time: 'on each vine there shall be a thousand branches, and each branch shall bear a thousand clusters, and each cluster produce a thousand grapes, and each grape produce a cor (about 120 gallons) of wine...because these are they who have to the consummation of time' (2 Baruch 29 (Apocrypha)).

Through this sign John wanted to signal the passing from the old to the new. The messianic era had arrived and the messianic bridegroom is the One who provides the wine (see John 3:29).

We drink the wine of the new covenant whenever we celebrate the Eucharist: we eat the Body and drink the Blood of Christ. This is our sign of the new life, which inebriates with the love of God poured out into our hearts.

*'Lord Jesus, our cross, your hour of glory, did indeed come, and because of your victory we drink the blood of the new covenant in the gift of your Eucharist.'*
