**GOSPEL REFLECTION:**

Lent is a sacred moment in the Church's year because we are invited to have some share in the mystery of Jesus' temptations in the desert. How elegantly and beautifully the Catechism of the Catholic Church expresses this: 'By the solemn forty days of Lent the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert', (*Catechism of the Catholic Church* 540). We too can expect to be tested and tempted, by whom?

St Mark says quite simply that Jesus was 'tempted by Satan' (v.12). The name Satan means 'adversary'. In Job we are given a vivid picture of Satan in God's heavenly court, along with all the other angels, where he has the role of accuser or prosecutor (see 1:6ff.). The Scriptures identify Satan as the serpent in the Garden of Eden who tempted Adam and Eve (Gen.3) and, therefore, as the origin of sin and temptation. What the Scriptures and tradition make clear is that we have a mortal enemy who, although a finite being created by God, is in a desperate struggle to overthrow God's reign, usurp his lordship and lead us away from God into darkness and death.

At the Easter vigil or on Easter Sunday we renew our baptismal promises when we reject Satan and all his empty promises. Lent is also a time for us to discover anew and afresh the gospel, the 'good news', which Jesus proclaimed immediately after his time of testing. The bad news is we are fallen and wounded and need to repent, and the second part, the Good News, is that God loves us and sent Jesus to save us. Stand firm, resist the devil, he will flee.

As Pope Leo the Great once said: 'The tempter ever on the lookout, wages war most violently against those whom he sees most careful to avoid sin.'

I remember times when I certainly put God to the test.
