FEASTDAY REFLECTION:

St John Lateran is the cathedral church of the diocese of Rome. It is the Pope's cathedral in his capacity as the Bishop of Rome, symbolizing his unity with parishioners in his diocese but also believers scattered throughout the world.

The Lateran Basilica is called 'the mother and head of all the churches of the city and the world'. In fact, this basilica was the first to be built after Emperor Constantine's edict, in 313, granting Christians freedom to practise their religion. The Emperor himself gave Pope Miltiades the ancient palace of the Laterani family, and the basilica, the baptistery and Bishop of Rome's residence – where the popes lived until the Avignon period – were all built there. The basilica's dedication was celebrated by Pope Sylvester in 324. It was initially named 'Most Holy Saviour', the names of St John the Baptist and St John the Evangelist only being added after the sixth century. Initially the observance of this feast was confined to the city of Rome but in 1565 it was extended to all the churches of the Roman rite. The honouring of this sacred building was a way of expressing love and veneration for the Church in Rome which as St Ignatius of Antioch said, 'presides in charity' over the whole Catholic communion (Letter to the Romans 1:1). Today's feast celebrates a mystery that is always real, present and relevant: God's desire to build a spiritual temple in the world, a community that worships him in spirit and truth (John 4:23-24). But this observance also reminds us of the importance of the material buildings in which the community gathers to celebrate the praises of God, for which it has a duty to take special care. For this we call upon the intercession of Mary Most Holy, that she help us to become like her, the 'house of God', a living temple of his love.

Father, thank you for making me a temple of the Holy Spirit, a dwelling for the Living God. Pour your Spirit afresh on me.

This is the month when we particularly pray all the faithful departed, for all the Holy Souls, especially beloved family members who have gone before us. You may wish to have a Mass said for a family member or friend who has died. If so, write down the details and place in an envelope with your offering and give it in at church or post it through the priest's house, 40 Village Street, opposite the church.

As you know from the newsletter we continue to celebrate Mass each day at 9.30 am.

Also, we must continue to pray for an end to warfare and violence in our world especially in Gaza, where we hope the ceasefire will hold, and the Ukraine where Russian aggression continues. Also for the Sudan in the grip of civil war and other places of conflict.
